11:30am-12:10pm Click here to view workshop allocation	Trauma App <i>This session will talk through the implementation of the Trauma App at the QEUH and RHC.</i>	Pre-Hospital – Major Trauma Triage <i>The adult and paediatric Major Trauma Triage Tools (MTTTs) are now being utilised by Scottish Ambulance Service clinicians in pre-hospital trauma care. The MTTTs were launched in-line with the Scottish Trauma Network (STN) on 30th August 2021 to triage trauma patients to the most appropriate definitive care. The MTTTs are a key part of trauma care and benefit patients who are significantly injured or involved in high mechanism incidents. This workshop will look at the adult and paediatric MTTTs, the changes to practice and influence on effective triage. There will also be interactive scenarios within the session to demonstrate the use of the MTTTs and major trauma triage in practice.</i>	NES Psychology <i>This session will introduce the high prevalence of traumatic events and the psychological impact that these can have on people. It will encourage participants to consider how the emotional impact of trauma may present in their major injury settings for patients and the staff teams involved in their care, and the potential of a trauma-informed approach in connecting with people at any stage of their recovery journey.</i>	Optimising Rehabilitation <i>Topic 1: Assessing PTA in Major Trauma: Accurate outcome prediction after traumatic brain injury (TBI) is important in order to enable appropriate rehabilitation planning and provision of accurate prognostic information for patients and their families (Walker et al., 2010). Currently, estimation of post-traumatic amnesia (PTA) is viewed as one of the best indicators of injury severity and predictor of functional and cognitive outcome following head injury (McMillan et al., 1996; Nakase-Richardson et al., 2009).</i>

				<p>A Revised-WPTA Scale (Ponsford et al., 2004) was developed for assessing patients with head injury. The Major Trauma TBI service in the Royal Infirmary of Edinburgh has implemented regular PTA scoring as part of the early assessment and intervention of this patient group. During this workshop we shall give some feedback on our findings and experience using this screening tool.</p> <p>Topic 2: Brief insight into the theory of Cognitive Behavioural Therapy (CBT) and associated case study of using this approach in a patient's rehabilitation.</p>
<p>12:15pm-1:00pm</p>	<p>Major Incidents – “How much medical care at scene?”</p> <p>Major incidents present a significant challenge in balancing three aspects of prehospital care at the scene: Triage, Treatment and Transport. The aim is to ensure that patients leave scene having been appropriately prioritised, with immediate threats to life and severe pain addressed, and sent to the right hospital to meet their needs using the best available means. This workshop will explore some of the challenges inherent in balancing these goals in the midst of a complex evolving incident.</p>	<p>STAG – Scottish Trauma Audit Group</p> <p>The session will be about making the best use of patient questionnaires and improving the collection rate to improve data quality. Some of this work is recognized as aligning with adult STAG criteria but we're keen to also identify the significant efforts which are more child-specific and may not always be picked up by these traditional tools. During the paediatric group workshop, we will be discussing standardization of criteria for recording a dataset across the</p>

Input from all geographical and specialty areas would be highly valued, particularly from stakeholders who contribute infrequently to paediatric care in addition to their more standard role (including pre-hospital and trauma unit staff)</i>
